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**PRESS STATEMENT**  
**AFRICAN UNION PANEL OF EMINENT AFRICAN PERSONALITIES –**  
**KENYA NATIONAL DIALOGUE AND RECONCILIATION**

**Nairobi, 7 July 2010** – The Dialogue Team of the Kenya National Dialogue and Reconciliation (KNDR) held its sixth review meeting today on the status of implementation of the KNDR agreements for the period April through June 2010.

The meeting discussed the findings of a report prepared by South Consulting – the research firm designated by the Panel of Eminent African Personalities to undertake independent monitoring and evaluation of the implementation process. The focus of the report was the implementation of the KNDR agreements in relation to the constitutional review process and forthcoming referendum.

On Agenda Item One (*Immediate action to stop the violence and restore fundamental rights and liberties*), the South report found that the majority of Kenyans believe that the 2010 Referendum will be peaceful, but there remain fears of violence breaking out in some areas. The report also noted that illegally armed groups that had been active in the post-election violence had redefined themselves as political agents in the referendum campaigns.

On Agenda Item Two (*Immediate measures to address the humanitarian crisis, promote reconciliation and healing*), the South report noted that there was a growing sense of acceptance of people from other communities but cautioned that mistrust was emerging again in areas where campaigns against the Proposed Constitution were taking place.

On Agenda Item Three (*How to overcome the political crisis*), the South report noted that the Coalition Government continues to hold together and concluded that the unity of the two Principals in supporting the Proposed Constitution had provided greater stability to the Coalition and the country in general.

Turning to Agenda Item Four (*Long-term issues and solutions*), the South report recalled that the constitutional review process had been initiated as a means to prevent a recurrence of the violence experienced following the 2007 elections. The report also indicated that the public was still very confident that the ICC intervention would end the culture of impunity by prosecuting those involved in the violence, given that local mechanisms had yet to deliver justice to victims. The report further noted that progress continued to be made in implementing electoral reforms: recent by-elections had been held successfully and electronic voter registration had been met with public approval.

At today's meeting, the Dialogue Team took note of the findings of the South report and acknowledged the need for continued commitment to the reform agenda. The Dialogue Team agreed that the next meeting would be held in mid-October 2010.
